Cornell notes

Make notes on the right. Then write the most important information in the key information section! Finally, try covering up the top sections of the page and writing a summary of your notes so you can check your understanding.

Question Matrix

What are you being asked to do? This instruction will usually be the verb or question word. It is used to explain how you should answer the question. Examples include 'describe', 'contrast' and 'explain'.

What are the topics, ideas, concepts or issues you need to refer to? These will usually be nouns and there can be more than one! They identify what you should refer to in your answer.

What is the scope of your answer? The will be indicated by limiter words. Limiters restrict your focus often to a specific event, time or place.

Structure outline for essay questions

Introduction

Your **introduction** should tell the reader:

- 1. Your answer to the question;
- 2. The topics / themes you will discuss;
- 3. The structure of the main body of your essay.

Include this in every body paragraph

Topic Sentence

Tell the reader what the paragraph is about.

Evidence Sentences

Tell the reader what evidence you have found about the topic.

Analysis Sentences

Tell the reader what is significant or important about this evidence.

Transition Sentence

Tell the reader how this paragraph connects to the next.

This is the topic sentence. Give a piece of evidence about the topic here; this can be a quote, paraphrase or data. The analysis sentence(s) here should explain what is important about the above evidence. Next, give another piece of evidence; again, this can be a quote, paraphrase or data. Follow this with analysis sentence(s) to explain why and what is important about this new piece of evidence. End the paragraph with a transition sentence that summarises what you have found out about the topic of this paragraph and how this connects to what is coming in the next paragraph.

Conclusion

Your **conclusion** should tell the reader what you found out about the topic / question:

- What solutions did you propose?
- What questions still need to be answered?
- What should the reader do or think after reading your paper?
